





#### Day 1: Arrival

# Day 2: Braulio Carrillo National Park, Riverboat to Tortuguero

Head north today to one of the most rugged regions in the country. The terrain and high rainfall conspire to create a myriad of waterfalls that can be seen from almost everywhere.

In Braulio Carrillo National Park, where biologists have created a unique research facility, there is an abundance of flora and fauna, and especially birds, of which 333 species have been observed. Bromeliads and orchids are among the 6,000 species of plant life that adorn the trees. You may spot animals such as the coati, armadillos, sloths, crocodiles and leaf-cutter ants.

Proceed toward the Caribbean coast, stopping at La Pavona to board a riverboat that will take you to Tortuguero National Park.

You'll see why this park is called the "Venice of Costa Rica" as you travel by riverboat along canals that meander through the dense lowland rainforest.

Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner Overnight: Tortuguero National Park

#### Day 3: Excursion along the Tortuguero National Park Canals

Today, board a riverboat to explore the many secondary canals of Tortuguero National Park, an area extremely rich in flora and fauna. Its humid tropical forest is home to many species of birds, insects and wildlife, such as crocodiles, jaguars, howler monkeys and peccaries.

This is the most important nesting site in the entire western half of the Caribbean for the green turtle. Other species of turtles which nest in the park include hawksbills, loggerheads and the giant leatherbacks.

Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner Overnight: Tortuguero National Park

#### Day 4: Travel to the Arenal Volcano area, Tabacon Hot Springs

**Travel to the Arenal Volcano area** • Today, depart Tortuguero National Park by riverboat.

Board your coach and travel to the Arenal Volcano area.

Visit Arenal Volcano National Park to get a close look at Arenal, a magnificent, constantly active volcano, which was reborn during an earthquake in 1968. See rocks spewing skyward and glowing lava enveloping the top of the cone.

**Tabacon Hot Springs** • Relax in the Tabacón Hot Springs, warmed by geothermal heat from the Arenal volcano.

Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner Overnight: Arenal Volcano area

#### Day 5: Travel to the Monteverde Cloud Forest Biological Reserve, Optional Sky Trek

Take one last look at the Arenal landscape before your journey to Monteverde.

Enjoy a visit to one of the richest and best-known biological reserves in the world. Don long pants and boots for a hike into the reserve, which is famous for its lookout points.

A local guide will accompany your group at the Monteverde Biological Reserve.

Optional Sky Trek Zip Line • Board an open-air gondola for a ride into the heights. Take in the view from the observation area before setting out on your thrilling ride back down, along a zip line track stretched between treetops and across canyons.

Meals included: Breakfast, Dinner Overnight: Monteverde Cloud Forest

#### Day 6: Tree Planting Program, Carara Biological Reserve, Manuel Antonio area

Tree planting program • Participate in the reforestation project of the Children's Eternal Rainforest (Bosque Eterno de Los Niños), which is overseen by the Monteverde Conservation League, by helping plant a tree.

Travel to the Manuel Antonio area, via the Carara Biological Reserve, • Follow the old Spanish route to the Pacific coast today, passing through mountainous valleys planted with coffee. Crocodile Viewing at the Tarcoles Bridge • Stop at the "Crocodile Bridge" in Tarcoles, the best known attraction of the Carara National Park, to catch sight of crocodiles, some ten feet long, camouflaged among the water hyacinths and other aquatic plants. Carara Biological Reserve • You will visit the renowned Carara Biological Reserve and experience the climatic transition from the dry north to the humid coastline of the Pacific coast. Carara is home to an abundance of wildlife including macaws, parrots, monkeys and sloths. Travel to the Manuel Antonio area • Travel to the Manuel Antonio area, which is hailed as one of the most beautiful regions on Costa Rica's Pacific coast.

Meals included: Breakfast, Dinner Overnight: Manuel Antonio area

#### Day 7: Excursion to Manuel Antonio National Park

Manuel Antonio National Park • Enjoy a bit of beaches and biology today, as you visit one of Costa Rica's most popular protected areas, the *Parque Nacional Manuel Antonio*. Its white sand beaches and turquoise waters are the most beautiful in Central America; its rain forests luxuriant and inhabited by orangeand-purple crabs, three-toed sloths and squirrel monkeys. Follow the trail up to Cathedral Point where you can enjoy spectacular views. Playful monkeys may join you!

Meals included: Breakfast, Dinner Overnight: Manuel Antonio area

#### Day 8: Travel to San Jose

Travel to San Jose • Travel to San José.

Meals included: Breakfast, Dinner Overnight: San Jose

#### Day 9: San Jose, Departure

**Depart San Jose** • *¡Hasta la vista!* You'll remember the warm, balmy air, the hot sun and the natural wonders.




