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Interactive Websites To Keep Your Child's Literacy Skills On Track

The amount of reading a child does outside of school has consistently been found to relate to growth in vocabulary, reading comprehension, verbal fluency, and general background information. Research states that just 20 minutes of reading per day exposes readers to 1.8 million new words per school year.

Reading does not need to be strictly in a chapter book. Though it is a school-wide expectation that students read in their Scholastic Reading Counts book each night, there are some exciting interactive web sites your child can visit to increase his/her literacy skills. These sites are free and are listed below:

<u>Education.com/e-learning/childrens-audio-books/</u>: Your child can download many popular book titles read by a famous celebrity! This is a website for all ages and includes a variety of levels of books. Your child will hear and follow along with a famous fluent reader!

National Geography for kids and the Smithsonian for kids (natgeo.com tweentribune.com) have free informational articles about fascinating nonfiction topics (animals, the Titanic, ancient civilizations, just to name a few!). There are also videos, pictures, and games.

Newsela.com has news articles about current events, taken from the nation's most popular newspapers, and written for middle school students. These articles are fascinating and can even be chosen at your child's Lexile level. There are quizzes and videos for each article too.

<u>Overdrive</u>.: Access this on the Hoover Middle School library page. Students can borrow digital high interest content, including eBooks (SRC books included!), audiobooks, and other great resources.

Freerice.com: Students learn new vocabulary words by playing an online trivia quiz game on this site. An added bonus is that for each new word they learn, this nonprofit website donates ten grains of rice to a third world country. It adds up quick!



Technology News

7th grade technology students opened the 2nd quarter by assuming the role of a structural engineer. Students competed in a tower building contest. They learned about structural design, forces, and loads. They built their designs using wooden coffee stirs and came up with some incredibly strong designs! Seventh Graders Take a Long Walk for Water for South Sudan

Hoover Middle School seventh graders finished reading A Long Walk to Water by Linda Sue Park just before Thanksgiving. The book not only informed us about the water shortage in South Sudan, but it also inspired us to do something about it. There are two main characters in the book, Nya and Salva. They both face challenges for survival in their lives. The biggest challenge is finding water, metaphorically and literally.

One of the book's main characters, Salva Dut, is a real person who has relocated to Rochester, New York. He has created an organization called Water for South Sudan. The organization raises money to drill wells in Sudanese villages. This gives the people of South Sudan freshwater close to their homes.

After reading A Long Walk to Water, the seventh graders felt empathetic and wanted to take charge and make a change. We walked carrying gallons of water around the school's track on November 22, 2017. We raised \$1895 in pledges for Water for South Sudan! A group of students announced the grand total during lunch to cheers and applause.

Samantha Christiano explained how A Long Walk to Water inspired her, "Reading A Long Walk to Water and walking in the fundraiser taught me to keep going and not give up. When I was walking, I wanted to stop and put the water down, but I kept walking."

Sam's classmate Erin Devine added, "A Long Walk to Water has taught me that life isn't fair, but I still need to pick myself up and try again. The walk taught me to persevere through tough times. Life can be hard, but nothing is impossible."

Hoover Middle School also participates in other service projects throughout the year, including "Socktober" and a Thanksgiving canned food drive. As seventh grader Anthony Torres said, "Sometimes you have to put up with what life throws at you, and maybe even throw















5th Grade Update

Fifth Grade Happenings

As we head towards the halfway point of the school year, Fifth Grade students have settled into the Middle School routine and are learning and working together with some great hands-on projects! In some of our ELA classes we are reading and writing stories fashioned after the Northwest Native Americans' totem pole legends that we learned about in Social Studies. We have created colorful totem poles to represent our tales. In others we are reading and learning about the rainforest as we conduct research on various animals found there. In Social Studies we have moved down south to keep warm as we gain information about early civilizations such as the Mayas, Aztecs and Incas. We will be creating projects to share our knowledge. In science we are studying how matter and energy flow through an ecosystem. Some saw this first hand by dissecting owl pellets to see what was inside of them. From the data the students were able to determine what the owls ate and then construct food webs to show their interpretation of the data. In math our 5th graders are busy working on Module 4, a long fraction unit dealing with multiplication and division with fractions. The students are showing their work pictorially and numerically, using different strategies they have learned. As a reminder, students should use www.zearn.org for help! It's a great tool if students are stuck on a lesson, absent from class, or if they want to aet ahead

Autumn 6th Grade News

We hope everyone is staying warm and safe this wintry season! We would first like to apologize for the missing sentence in the first few lines of our last newsletter which caused our sentiments to be less than what was intended. Our team of students received the original newsletter with the color pictures as well.

In this quarter of Mrs. Pilato's **ELA class** we are knee deep in our reading of *The Lightning Thief* and have even had a sword fighting lesson or two! Students are developing skills with developing main (key) idea and supporting details. They are also developing an understanding of character and how *"The Hero's Journey"* plot line aligns with this adventure. Vocabulary (and "Smartie" words) have been a key focus during our reading of the book (and in our weekly reading basics). During this quarter we developed another 4-5 paragraph essay about a hero of our own using our understanding of introductions, claim, topic sentences (main ideas), elaboration (the supporting details or facts that help to explain the main idea), and closing. We also spent a day with a hero named, Martin Luther King Jr. as we watched him give his infamous "I Have a Dream" speech. We even read our own personalized level of the same speech to complete as a reading basics. We are also cognizant of the use of our figurative (colorful) language in all our reading endeavors. Martin Luther King Jr., for example, used many metaphors in his speech to help create a strong picture (connection) for the people he was speaking to. We are realizing that it takes many pieces to put together the puzzle that is reading and writing.

In Mr. Butler's **MATH class** we have been working on building a better understanding of rational numbers. Those are the numbers that can be written as fractions and graphed on a number line. Students have been learning about negative rational numbers and how they are ordered on a number line. We are using real-world examples, such as elevation, temperature, and banking, to learn how positive and negative numbers are used in people's daily lives.



We have continued to use technology to supplement traditional classroom instruction. Students spend time each day working with websites that help build their basic skills in mathematics as well as apply them to real-world situations. Have your child show you these sites and talk with them about why they enjoy them. Also, have them show you the Schoology website that we are using.



We are all looking forward to extending our learning (and the daylight hours) in 2018!! Happy New Year!

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TEAM 7-1 UPDATES

It has been an exciting school year so far on Team 7-1! SOCIAL STUDIES: In Mrs. Halt's class, the students are currently finishing a unit on the Revolutionary War. We are looking forward to starting our next unit on the U.S.Constitution. We will be looking at a variety of Supreme Court cases dealing with the rights of young people. The students are also working on their nonfiction projects. MATH: Mrs. Yemma's Math 7 students finished a unit on equations and are beginning an inequality unit. Accelerated Math students just finished their equations and inequality unit and did a great job. They will be studying proportional relationships next. The students continue to do a great job of completing their weekly reviews, getting them checked throughout the week, and earning high scores as a result! ELA: Mr. Kleismit's classes are in the middle of their second novel unit, focusing on Freak the Mighty by Rodman Philbrick. The story focuses on two boys, Kevin and Max, who join forces and become the unstoppable Freak the Mighty, "slaying dragons and fools and walking high above the world." Before starting the novel, students studied the legend of King Arthur and the concept of chivalry, then they designed their own coats of arms with symbols of their individual strengths. They even adopted titles based on their character traits, such as "Dylan the Dependable" and "Laniya the Trustworthy." Looking forward, students will have SRC quizzes on March 2 and March 23, so you should see independent reading books coming home as well. SCIENCE: In Mr. Spengler's class, the students are in the middle of the weather unit. They all have been assigned groups to simulate a news/weather station. We are using Google Classroom via a class set of Chromebooks. They have been working on a 4-day weather presentation based on a scenario assigned to each group. These presentations mimic an actual weather forecast found on any of our local television stations. They will be presenting their final project as a live broadcast starting on Monday, January 29, through Wednesday, January 31, in our classroom. Our next unit is Weathering and Erosion. Team 7-1 will keep on roaring toward the end of the year!

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Team 7-2 Update

Oh the weather outside is frightful, but what's happening in our classes is so delightful!

ELA: In Mrs. Bacon's ELA classes, students have been creating videos about human rights defenders making a difference in our world. Students selected a defender, completed research on the individual, connected that defender's work with our local community, and then created a narrated video. Some of these human rights defenders include Salva Dut, Malala, Elie Wiesel, Jamie Nabozny and the Dalai Lama. The videos are being submitted to the Speak Truth to Power Student Video Contest (www.speaktruthvideo.com) sponsored by the Robert F. Kennedy Center for Human Rights. On the contest website it states, "Robert F. Kennedy believed in the power of the individual - that it only takes one person with courage and conviction to make a difference." This idea of individuals having the power to make a difference is the overall theme of our ELA class this year. **SOCIAL:** In social studies with Mr. Sander, the students are studying the American Revolution. Currently, they are on the road to the revolution, covering such topics as the Boston Massacre and the Boston Tea Party. The war should be over in a couple of weeks! **SCIENCE:** In science class, students are studying Meteorology. Students are working in groups of two or three and will cycle through six learning/lab stations over the next three weeks. They will investigate how the density of air masses determines how weather fronts move in and bring specific types of weather. Students will build an anemometer and go outside to measure wind speed at three locations around the Hoover Campus. They will sling a psychrometer at three locations around the building to determine the relative humidity and much more. Students are learning skills that will enable them to be citizen weather watchers and predictors. Someday, we may see one of our students announcing the approach of lake effect weather on one of our local television stations. MATH: In math, students have been working on solving various types of equations and inequalities and graphing their solutions on a number line. They will continue with algebra and review for their midterm.

News from the Health Office

All required health forms for the 2018-19 school year will be mailed home in May. This includes the physical forms for 7th graders, immunization requirements, and medication forms and/or emergency care plans for your child for the next school year. Please make sure that this paperwork is completed, signed, and turned into the Health Office by September 2018. When you take your child to the doctor's office for a physical, please make sure you ask for any paperwork to be filled out at the time of your visit. Many pediatricians' offices will charge you a fee to complete/process paperwork if you ask after the time of your visit!

If your child is interested in playing sports for Hoover Middle School, or playing up to a high school sport at either Kenmore West or Kenmore East, please have him/her see the nurse about his/her physical. You can also check the Kenmore Town of Tonawanda district website, under Athletic Department, for further information about sports and any forms that your child may need completed in order to play.

Please note that **all medications**, whether for emergency purposes (i.e. Epi-pen, Glucagon, Benadryl, inhaler), as well as any over-the-counter medications for pain, cough, and cold/allergy symptoms **require a note from your child's health care provider.** Students **should not be carrying** these medications on them without medical documentation, and are in direct violation of school district policy.

In the beginning of June, letters will be sent out to families, asking that a parent/ guardian come to the school by **June 20th, 2018 (last day of school)** to pick up their child's medication. Any medication not picked up by that day will be disposed of in accordance with both the New York State Department of Education and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation guidelines. Medications **are not allowed** to be kept for the following school year. Please make arrangements with the health office to pick up any unused medication for your child.





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
