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## Part II: Key Events and Major Battles of WWI 1914-1918

Use the Data to Identify 2 Keys to Each Event in Your Packet

**A. Eastern Front**: **Battle of Tannenberg** in September 1914. Explain what happened to the Russian Forces and how this affected the Western Front.

- **B.** Western Front: <u>Battle of Marne</u> on Sept. 10, 1914. Explain what happened and how this battle led to Trench War.
- **C. Eastern Front**: <u>Gallipoli Campaign</u> of 1915. Explain what happened during the disastrous amphibious attack.
- **D.** Western Front: Siege of <u>Verdun</u> in 1916. Explain why this is the bloodiest battle of WWI and how Verdun became an example of a 'War of Attrition'.
- **E.** Western Front: <u>Battle of the Somme</u> July 1, 1916. Identify how many British Troops died in the 1<sup>st</sup> hour of the Battle and explain the results of the battle.
- **F.** Western Front: <u>3<sup>rd</sup> Battle of Ypres</u> Sprint 1917. Describe what happened during the Battle and how this changed warfare forever.
- **G. Global Politics**: <u>US. Would enter the War</u> on April 6, 1917. Determine 3 Reasons why the United States would declare War on Germany.
- **H. Global Politics**: 2<sup>nd</sup> Russian Revolution November 1917. How the Germany Military directly lead to the Russian Revolution and how does this help the Germanys on the Western Front.
- **I.** Western Front: <u>Battle of Cambria</u> November 20, 1917. Explain what happened and how this battle would change the history of warfare forever.
- **J.** Western Front: <u>Battle of Aimens</u> (Scroll #9) August 8, 1918. As part of the Hundred Days Offensive explain what happened and the results for both sides. Bonus: Why is this day sometimes called 'The Black Day for Germany'?
- **K.** Western Front: Meusse-Argonne Forest October, 1918. Explain what happened and why this is considered the 'Bloodiest Battle for the US' during WWI
- **L. Global Politics: German Armistice** Fall of 1918. Watch the <u>Clip</u> and read <u>Facts</u> <u>1-3</u> identify the Time, Date, Location, and Month the WWI Armistice went into effect.
