

Ken-Ton Schools Begin School Year with New Academies

he Kenmore-Tonawanda UFSD has received formal approval from the New York State Education Department to offer three new Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs to students starting with the 2012-2013 school year. Offered as Career Academies, these new programs include the Computer Networking & Technology Academy, Pre-Engineering Academy, and Virtual Finance & Business Academy. Each CTE program or Career Academy offers students a variety of unique opportunities as they prepare for post-high school education and future careers.

Over the past two years, a select group of faculty members worked to complete an exhaustive program approval process that included curricula review, crosswalks with New York State Learning Standards, and staff development and training. Additionally, each program was reviewed by an advisory board composed of representatives from business, industry, government, and the school district. By granting formal approval, the New York State Education Department verifies that the District is indeed offering well-planned and highly-rigorous programs to students as they prepare for college and careers.

Starting with the 2010-2011 school year, the District has been able to take advantage of funding available through the New York State Carl D. Perkins Grant. This helped to fund program development efforts and upgrade facilities at Kenmore East and Kenmore West High

Schools. Academy and CTE Program planning also coincided with the District's investment in the internationally-recognized Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Pre-Engineering Program. The PLTW Program is now open to Pre-Engineering Academy and non-academy students alike. The PLTW Program is in its fifth year of implementation offering five unique engineering and design courses to students, including topics such as robotics, three-dimensional modeling, product development, and the engineering design process.

Students participating in a Career Academy have a number of advantages as they prepare for post-high school graduation plans. Academy students have the opportunity to earn college credit through a variety of "hands-on" courses. Additionally, Career Academy students have a variety of opportunities to gain valuable experience through work-based learning opportunities that include job shadowing, internships, workplace visits, and cooperative learning. Finally, among a number of other advantages, students completing program requirements will receive a unique CTE diploma endorsement attesting to their high level of achievement and learning.

On a typical day at both Kenmore East and West High Schools, students in Introduction to Engineering Design classes can be found producing components for their designs using a three-dimensional printer. Designs are created in engineering design labs using state-

> of-the-art modeling software. Technology education students have a wide variety of courses, including courses on digital electronics, robotics, construction, manufacturing, and an openended capstone design course for high school seniors.

> At Kenmore East High School, students in Nancy Pray's Business classes use business productivity apps on Apple iPads purchased using grant funding. Ken-Ton's Virtual Enterprise and Finance Academy provides a unique learning environment where students begin to learn how to be successful in today's business environment. In

each Career Academy, students gain real-world experience using industry-standard technology.

With the start of the new school year, over 100 Ken-Ton students have enrolled in a Career Academy.

Looking down the road, the District has ongoing plans to expand Academy offerings, including an Information Technology Academy that is still in the approval process. "The Ken-Ton Academies are an integral part of our Multiple Pathways initiative that works to offer all students meaningful educational opportunities that prepare them for college or career", indicated Superintendent of Schools Mark P. Mondanaro. "The first participating students in the history of our District will also be graduating from Ken West this year with International Baccalaureate Diplomas and Ken East is just now starting the same offering. Additionally, hundreds of students are taking Advanced Placement courses annually and almost three hundred students attend Vocational Training courses through Erie 1 BOCES."

During the coming year, efforts will continue to educate students, parents, staff, and the Ken-Ton community about the new opportunities available to students. Additionally, work is underway to recruit additional assistance from the business community to strengthen the business-to-education connection that makes these Career Academies a meaningful educational opportunity.

New PLTW Course Offered

According to the National Association Of Colleges and Employers (NACE), in their Job Outlook 2012 Report, the top five attributes employers look for on a candidate's resume are: ability to work in a team, leadership, communication skills, problem-solving skills, and strong work ethic. Fortunately for Ken-Ton students, the opportunity to develop these skills is available in a wide variety of technology education courses offered at the middle and high school levels. Furthermore, with the 2012-2013 school year, a new opportunity for students to be college and career ready is available, building and developing these employability attributes, in a course called Engineering Design & Development.

The 2012-2013 school year is the fifth and final year of implementation of the internationally recognized pre-engineering program called Project Lead the Way (PLTW) at the high school level. The addition of this program to the district's high schools has ushered in a wide-range of new opportunities for students. Over the past five years there has been a noticeable change in high school technology education classrooms, as new equipment and computer software has become available

for student use. Additionally, the curriculum has been updated and teachers have benefited from high-quality training at the Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT) that has transformed the learning environment to the benefit of students.

Engineering Design & Development, or PLTW EDD as it is known, is a capstone design course where students put into practice the interdisciplinary knowledge and skills they have developed throughout their coursework, including the integration of mathematics, science, reading, and writing. Students, working in teams, identify a problem or opportunity requiring a technical or engineered solution and work towards creating a functional prototype that satisfies the recognized need or want. At the completion of the design project, all student work groups will be evaluated by the PLTW advisory board, which is composed of representatives of business and industry.

Adding PLTW EDD to the course offerings has been funded through the district's Carl D. Perkins Grant, which is provided by the New York State Education Department to create and improve Career & Technical Education (CTE). This funding has been used to create the district's four Career Academies (go to tiny.cc/KenTonSchools for more Career Academy information). A significant component of the funding has been dedicated to curriculum and staff development.

The addition of PLTW EDD brings the total number of PLTW courses offered to five. Courses offered include: Introduction to Engineering Design (formerly known as DDP), Computer Integrated Manufacturing, Principles of Engineering, and Digital Electronics. Students completing these courses are highly prepared for college and careers in technical fields including, but not limited to, engineering. Students interested in hands-on learning, high-tech careers, the opportunity to develop highlyvalued employability attributes, or simply looking for a unique learning experience are encouraged to speak with their counselor or find their closest tech teacher.

What's Happening in the Business Department at KW

The Business Department's new **Virtual Enterprise & Finance Academy** is underway where the **Virtual Enterprise** students have studied Entrepreneurs and are currently presenting their research on famous entrepreneurs.

In Mr. McPhee's Business and Personal Law courses,

students are learning civil trial procedures and will be conducting a mock trial.

The students in Mrs. Brania's Web Design class just finished learning about the World Wide Web and Internet Safety. This week the students are starting to learn HTML (hypertext markup language)



to create their very own Web pages.

Business Math students have mastered the Skills Workshops and are now learning about their paychecks, what to do with all that money they earn, and how to keep track of what they have.

Students in Mrs. Brania's **Work-Study** program are learning about jobs and careers. Over the next few weeks, various guest speakers will be coming in to talk to the students about career exploration, interviewing for success and résumé tips.

Our future accountants from Mrs. Herr's **Accounting** class are well on their way to reconciling balance sheets, debits, credits, T-accounts and oh, don't forget ALOE!

Students taking **Keyboarding Personal Documents** and **Computers & the Internet** are really getting some handson experience learning the keyboard. Why they're almost finished with the letters and will soon be learning numbers – without looking at their hands!

Mrs. Herr's CEIP (Career Exploration Internship Program) interns are going in all directions: Cora, Amanda, and Patrick are headed back to elementary school in kindergarten, 5th grade and physical education classes and speaking of sports, Kelcei is getting very involved with her mentor as a sports trainer at Nichols School. Nickel, bronze, steel, that's what Justin will be working with as he tries his hand at machining with Ace Specialty. BFMS Family and Consumer Science Classes to Pilot a New Junior Achievement Program for 7th Graders

Junior Achievement of WNY is excited to partner with Ben Franklin Middle School to pilot a new Junior Achievement (JA) Program, JA Career Ready: Tools for Tomorrow. Only 16 Junior Achievement areas across the United States were invited to pilot this new material and provide feedback toward the final changes. Ben Franklin's Family and Consumer Science Department's four seventh grade classes participating in the pilot program this fall are representing WNY in the development process.

JA Career Ready: Tools for Tomorrow provides practical information about preparing for the working world while still in middle school. The following key topics are discussed: personal branding; career mapping; work ethics and professionalism; job hunting tools; and skills, interests, working environment, and job forecasting in career selection.

The four classes, taught by Mrs. Amy Donn, are each receiving six lessons presented by local business professionals: Michael Barrett Winter, Premier Relationship Manager at HSBC Bank; Terrance Farrell, Foreclosure Specialist at M&T Bank; Jim Nowak, Field Training Manager at Pepsico; and Leslie Segarnick, former President of Action Employment Resources. Along with teaching the pilot curriculum, the four volunteers will also share their "real world" experiences with the students. By creating partnerships between educators, the business community and volunteers, JA empowers students with the skills they need to own their economic success.

Throughout the six lessons, students will participate in many hands-on activities such

as interviewing one another, designing their own logos, creating job murals, making recruiting posters for a career fair, conducting a job hunting scavenger hunt, and receiving journals. Their feedback, along with Amy Donn's, the JA volunteers' and JA staff members' input, will be reviewed carefully by JA USA as they make final changes to the program, which will be launched nationwide in Fall 2013.

Not only does JA value the opportunity to pilot this program at Ben Franklin Middle, but JA is also pleased to maintain its longstanding relationship with the Ken-Ton School District this year, providing students in grades Kindergarten through 12 with financial literacy, work readiness and entrepreneurship programs.
