We had some extra time a little bit before the blizzard and travel ban to prepare. We had flashlights, extra food, and other necessities. Although we were prepared for anything, our break went smoothly, so we had no need for flashlights or other items from preparation other than extra food. The worst day of all was Christmas Eve. That day we had to go outside every one and a half hours to two hours. This was because we quickly realized that day that the snowdrift in our backyard had completely buried our furnace exhaust pipe. If we had not quickly acted on our plans to unbury it our carbon monoxide detector (a detector for a poisonous gas that can be fatal) would have gone off. My parents realized this before I was awake, so when I woke up I had to look for them. I was really confused because I did not think they would go outside, but I could still hear them. Moments after they had unburied the furnace exhaust pipe, our neighbor sent a text to my parents. I was a little scared because we got a call from the school district saying that Hoover was being turned into a warming shelter in case the power went out. We did not lose power at all during the blizzard but the lights flickered a few times. On the first day of the blizzard, it was raining but then I looked out a few minutes later and was surprised to see everything covered in snow. When the blizzard was just starting to get bad it was a little after we ate lunch; that is when I asked if I could have my friend over that lives across the street from my mom's house. My mom said yes so I put on a jacket, boots and some gloves and walked over. When I got to his house I rang the doorbell and my friend came running to the door. It took my friend a few minutes to get his snow stuff on and the snow was up to my knees. We ran back to my house as fast as we could because the icy snow was blowing in our faces and it hurt. Roaming Fireflies

There are many different names for fireflies, including, Fireflies/Fire beetles/Lightning bugs/Glow worms, etc. Did you know that there are currently over 2,000 species of fireflies living in the world? Despite their name, fireflies are not flies (although they look similar) but instead are classified as beetles in the Lampyridae family. However, only some fireflies emit light. Fireflies in the western United States, for example, cannot emit light. Meanwhile, in the eastern United States, fireflies can glow. I found this information from firefly.org. Fireflies visit us in July and August, and many of us have fond memories of them. However, fireflies are perishing around the U.S. and the entire world. Nobody knows yet why fireflies are actually endangered, but we can surely blame humans. A glow worm's environment choice is warm, near bodies of water and longer grass. However, there is one problem: in America, and all around the world, our grasslands, open fields, and forests are being destroyed, including a lot of noisy boat traffic on waterways. As their habitat passes from sight, the number of fireflies decreases.

Deforestation, pollution, and increased use of pesticides may also contribute to the destruction of firefly habitats and natural prey, according to many websites. Scientists confirm that too much light at night can kill fire beetles, but there is plenty of evidence to suggest that light pollution is the primary victim of firefly killing. All species of fireflies, male and female, use the language of lights to communicate with others, such as to attract mates, defend territory, or warn predators that they are not palatable. If the light is too strong at night, fireflies can not do anything unless other fireflies can see the light pattern. This means that the fireflies cannot mate, resulting in fewer firefly larvae next season.

Firefly females lay 100 spherical eggs on the soil surface during mating. Fireflies prefer moist soil and lay their eggs under mulch or fallen leaves where the soil does not dry out easily. Some fireflies lay their eggs in vegetation rather than directly on the ground. Firefly eggs usually hatch in three to four weeks. Some fire beetle eggs are bioluminescent (able to emit light), and if you are lucky enough to find them on the ground, you can see them glowing faintly. I found this information from thoughtco.com.

Fun Facts:

-Firefly light can be yellow, green, or orange. I found this fact and the rest in smithsonianmag.com.

-Firefly larvae may glow, including ones that live underground or underwater. They rely on their light to warn predators that they are not palatable. This helps them to survive.

-Firefly larvae are carnivorous (feeding on other animals), and mainly enjoy snails. Some adult fireflies usually live off of nectar and pollen, and some firefly species feed off of other firefly species, while other adult fireflies do not eat at all.

-A-z-animals.com states the average lifespan of a wild firefly is roughly one year. Adult fireflies only live long enough to mate and lay eggs.

Fireflies play a critical role in the ecosystem and pollinate flowers. The reduction in habitat and the increased use of lights can be the reason that fireflies are becoming more rare. Fireflies are captivating creatures that carry excitement to summer nights. If they go extinct, it will be a great loss to habitats and generations of human beings all over the world.

How to Catch a Firefly with your Hands:


Fireflies are harmless creatures. They do not sting, bite, have pincers, or are venomous to humans. If you want to catch a firefly, visit a field of fireflies. Carefully approach it, and swoop/raise your hands so the firefly can land on your hand. (Make sure you do not clap your hands, because that will kill them!) Quickly close your hands so the firefly will not escape easily, and let them go anytime if you want. If you want to put it in a jar, first make sure you have a wet paper towel on the bottom of the jar, and holes in the lid for them to breathe air. Slowly let them or move them into the jar and close the lid. Do not keep them for more than two days, as they have short lifespans and need to mate outside. Congrats, you just learned how to catch a firefly!


The Buffalo Bills

How to Make Slime

Do you like to buy slime but you do not know how to make slime at home? Here are some different ways to make slime on your own. As always, make sure to only create slime if you do not have sensitivities or allergies to these ingredients.

I found two ways to make slime from https://www.youtube.com/watch? v=eaALjlyKDZI. The lady who made this video on YouTube is Courtney Wohl. Here is what she said to do:

1. Put 1 bottle of glue in a glass bowl. You can add food coloring to the glue if you like. Next, make your activator by combining 1 cup of warm water with 1 teaspoon of Borax. Slowly stir in Borax, just a little bit at a time, until the slime is formed.

2. For a more fluffy slime, use an entire bottle of glue and the same amount of shaving foam/cream. Mix it together. Make the activator by mixing one cup of water with one teaspoon of Borax. Just like the previous recipe, you only want to add in a little bit at a time, because you might not need very much for it to turn into slime. Knead the slime.

I found another recipe for fluffy slime by Gillain Bower on YouTube. For a video on how to make this slime, go to https://www.youtube.com/watch? v=s1IS20IWE80. Start at 1 minute and 50 seconds in to the video to save time. Toward the end of the video there is an optional suggestion to add small colorful foam balls as add-ins, but you could use other add-ins, such as clay sprinkles, glitter or charms.

Here are the directions:

Put together ¹/₂ cup of glue, ¹/₂ cup of shaving cream, and ¹/₂ cup of foaming soap mix. Then add one tablespoon of cornstarch. Next, add a couple pumps of body lotion or hand lotion. In a separate container, mix together 1 teaspoon of Borax and one cup of warm water. Add one teaspoon at a time of the Borax solution to the other container that has the glue, shaving cream, soap mix, cornstarch, and lotion. Mix it together. Add one or more teaspoons of the Borax solution until you get the consistency you want for your slime.

Here is a slime recipe if you only want to use a few ingredients (glue, baking, soda, water): Pour 1 cup of white glue into a mixing bowl. Add 1 tablespoon of baking soda. Mix the contents of the bowl thoroughly. Add more or less glue depending on how much you like. Food coloring is optional. Did you know that you can make slime that is edible? All you need is three simple ingredients: any color of your favorite JELL-O Sugar Free Gelatin, one cup of cornstarch and ½ cup of hot water. Mix together and enjoy! See www.myfoodandfamily.com for more information.

How to Make Your Own 3-D Paper Dragon Head Puppet

One time I searched for how to make a paper dragon on YouTube. Then I made up my own steps after watching several videos. Here they are: <u>Step 1</u>: Get a sheet of canvas paper or regular paper that does not have lines on it. Do not use cardstock, because it is not as easy to color on the shiny side of cardstock.

<u>Step 2</u>: On a folded piece of paper draw a trapezoid shape that fits around your hand. Cut around the outside perimeter of the shape. It should look like a really tall trapezoid with 3 flaps on 3 sides. On another piece of folded paper repeat this step again to make a total of two trapezoids, or just have a second sheet of paper under your original paper and cut both shapes out at the same time.

<u>Step 3</u>: Cut a long strip of paper from the top of the paper. This will make a long rectangle Glue or tape the middle of this rectangle to the shortest side of the top trapezoid figure. Then glue the rest of the strip to the other sides of the top trapezoid.

Step 4: Cut the tip of your second trapezoid off after you fold the sides of it. Glue the two sides you have on the strip. Make sure there is enough room for your hand to go in.

Do the same thing for the bottom jaw of the dragon. Make sure there is enough room for your thumb. Do not make the bottom jaw too small, or it will not fit as well.

<u>Step 5</u>: Draw flaps on the bottom jaw and top jaw.

<u>Step 6</u>: Cut out a square from the paper. Put the strip of paper in the middle of the puppet.

<u>Step 7</u>: Decorate. Fold another sheet of paper in half. Trace all four of the top sides on that paper, so we can make the top half of the dragon. Use your creativity to give it a cool look. Keep the parts of the dragon's head in proportion. For example, the ears should not be bigger than the head. Glue the parts that you just made to the sides on the dragon. You can make accessories (examples: ears, eyes, horns, spikes and other random stuff) to your design as well.


Since dragons have long snouts, this type of puppet works well, but if you want to try to create a different animal that has a long snout, such as a giraffe, or a horse, that is another option. If you need some assistance with making your dragon, there are lots of examples and video tutorials that can be found on the internet.
