Book Reviews



The Lost Hero by Rick Riordan Reviewed by Sanya Das

Are you a fan of Greek and/or Roman mythology? Perhaps you have read a book by Rick Riordan, who has written the famous series called *Percy Jackson & the Olympians*. If so, you will want to read *The Lost Hero*, a mix of Greek and Roman mythology, the first book of another series by Riordan. We start off with an amnesiac boy, Jason, who has woken up on a random school bus, holding hands with a random girl: Piper McLean, he sees a random best friend: Leo Valdez, and has no memory of his past. Suddenly, on their class field trip to the Grand Canyon, his obnoxious bully Dylan, turns into a storm spirit, and captures their teacher, Coach Hedge. Then, he, along with Piper and Leo, are given a prophecy sending them off on a quest to save the bratty queen of the gods, Hera, from Gaea, the most powerful goddess of the earth, who has a vicious plan to overthrow the gods. If you are a fan of suspenseful plot and action, this book is a must-read.

The Reason I Jump by Naoki Higashida Reviewed by Mrs. Zummo

The Reason I Jump by Naoki Higashida, translated by KA Yoshida and David Mitchell, gives the reader an opportunity to gain the author's perspective of what it is like to be a non-speaking 13-year-old who has autism. Higashida relies on an alphabet grid to be able to answer as many as 58 open-ended questions about his personal experiences with autism. The author gives very well-thought out and thorough responses to each question, and he also wrote a short story, entitled "I'm Right Here," as a way to further help people understand what it feels like to not be able to speak to express yourself. This book, originally published in Japan, was eventually translated to English, for an even greater global impact. Some of my favorite parts of this book relate to Higashida's responses to questions about why he avoids eye contact, why he often puts his hands over his ears, and why sometimes he will start to run away from the people who are taking care of him without any forewarning. In my opinion, this book is a fantastic resource for anyone who would like to learn more about what life is like for some people with autism who are not able to speak. This non-fictional book gives the reader an opportunity to develop more empathy and a greater appreciation for the immense potential of certain individuals who, through no fault of their own, cannot easily express themselves.

Clay Projects by Sanya Das

What is clay? Clay is a soft, loose material that can be used to make many things such as pots, bowls, mugs, jewelry, sculptures, construction, medicine, etc. The most known use of clay is clay art, also known as clay modeling or clay illustrations. "Clay illustrations are 3D figures, portraits or sculptures made out of different types of clay. The artwork requires you to mold, craft and shape pieces of clay to arrive at an imaginative or real-life end product. Once completed, the artwork can be preserved as a digital illustration or a physical piece," states redbull.com. With clay, you can make anything with your creativity from a cute dish, to a small animal, or even a new vase to make up for your mom's broken one! So, what do you want to make?

Tips:

- You can always paint your creations with paint after it dries to give it color.
- Always use glaze (like Mod Podge, glass seal, or resin) to prevent your creations from getting ruined.
- You can use sandpaper to sand the rough sides to make it smoother.
- Water helps stick clay together and makes it easier to mold.
- Leave your creations in an air space with no direct sunlight to prevent them from cracking!
- It also requires patience because the drying process takes at least one day to dry, depending on how big your creation is.



Students Create 3-D Figures for Future Ready Project by Mrs. Zummo

Fifth, sixth, and seventh graders in my classes created various geometric figures using a special pen called the 3-Doodler Start Plus. This type of item used a special plastic filament that warms up just enough to be able to create various artistic and mathematical designs. Some of my students created 3-D prisms, and then they created line plots to demonstrate the attributes (related to the number of vertices, edges, and faces) of these prisms. Other students used the pens to make colorful representations of prime numbers. Also, some of my students made various graphs from the Canva website after evaluating responses from student-generated surveys. There were teachers from other schools who also displayed their projects at this event at Kenmore Junior Senior High School on February 29. The event was well attended by teachers, administrators, other district employees, students, parents, and Ms. Guthrie, a representative from the NYS Education Department. I enjoyed participating in this opportunity, and I would like to create a different type of Future Ready project with my students next year.
