All five of our secondary schools compete proudly in the Niagara Frontier League (NFL). The NFL has been in existence since 1937 and we in Kenmore are honored to be one of the founding members. The NFL is highly regarded throughout Western New York and is well known for its history, traditions, ethical practices, upstanding administrators, commitment to sportsmanship, high eligibility standards, the Student Advisory Council and rivals that respect each other. We are proud of these ideals and will do everything in our power to build on them.



Conduct of all involved in the Extracurricular Athletic Program

As parents, when your children become involved in Kenmore-Tonawanda UFSD Athletic Program, you have the right to know what expectations have been placed on your son or daughter.

- Parents, coaches, players, and fans should know that <u>participation is</u> <u>an honor and privilege</u> which requires them to conduct themselves in a manner that brings honor and pride to their school and Kenmore-Town of Tonawanda community.
- Interscholastic competition provides valuable lessons and learning experiences that are not possible in the regular classroom setting. All involved must support the need to develop the ability to compete with enthusiasm and to accept winning with grace and losing with dignity.
- A genuine interest in and enjoyment of interscholastic competition requires conduct that reflects the understanding that contests, as a part of the overall school program are intended to be enjoyed.
- Respect for the cultural and ethnic diversity of one's opponents, their school, and community is a fundamental tenet of wholesome athletic competition. This standard suggests that planned activity is needed to demonstrate a warm and friendly welcome, mutual respect, and a genuine readiness to participate in a sportsmanlike manner.
- Players should demonstrate both knowledge of the rules and respect for game officials and their decisions. Coaches and school officials have the responsibility to teach and encourage these attributes.



Kenmore-Tonawanda UFSD Expectations

Ken-Ton strives to encourage good sportsmanship throughout our athletic program, and this includes good behavior during athletic contests. We expect all players, coaches, and spectators at our contests to be respectful of players, coaches, supervisors, officials, and other spectators.

Fans are encouraged to applaud the efforts of their team and should not engage in any behavior that is distracting or derogatory towards opponents or officials. We believe it is imperative to let the players, coaches, and officials play the game. Fans can be an asset for their team by supporting and cheering good play, but the Kenmore-Tonawanda UFSD will not permit any behavior that detracts from the proper conduct of the game or that disadvantages a player or team.

- Treat all visitor to contest as you would treat guests in your home
- Use only cheers that support and uplift the team
- Respect the integrity and judgment of game officials
- Do not throw any objects onto the playing surface at any time
- Do not engage in the use of controlled substances before, during, or after the games

Spectators Expectations

The team bench or team sideline area is off limits to all spectators. Only authorized school personnel are permitted. (Example: statisticians, clock operators, trainers, media, managers.) The school reserves the right to remove any spectator from a contest for unsportsmanlike conduct or behavior. The school also reserves the right to refuse attendance to those whose conduct is not appropriate to the spirit of good sportsmanship. Sportsmanship is the responsibility of all people involved in the Kenmore Town of Tonawanda School District. Let us all join together in helping each other make Ken-Ton Athletics what it was intended to be – a physical and emotional growing experience.

Communication Expectations

Parenting and coaching can be both challenging and rewarding. By establishing a clear understanding both parties involved can learn to respect and accept the actions of the other. This, in turn, will ultimately lead to greater benefits for our students. This begins with clear communication between the Athletic Department, the coaches, and the parents.

Communication you should expect from the Athletic Department

- 1. Information explaining the philosophy and policies of the Ken-Ton Athletic Department.
- 2. Required forms to be completed by the parents and athletes to allow participation in our athletic program.
- 3. Help in answering any parent questions or concerns about our Athletic Department policies.

Communication you should expect from your son/daughter's coach

- 1. Philosophy of the coach
- 2. Expectations the coach has for your son or daughter
- 3. Locations and times of all practices and contests
- 4. Team rules and requirements
- 5. Notification of injury or disciplinary action





Communication your coach should expect from parents

- 1. Concerns expressed directly to the coach with your son/daughter's knowledge.
- 2. Notification of any schedule conflicts well in advance.
- 3. Specific concern in regard to a coach's philosophy and/or expectations.
- 4. Support towards the commitment of the program.
- 5. Respect for the difficult job of coaching.

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Appropriate concerns to discuss with coaches

- 1. The treatment of your son or daughter mentally and physically.
- 2. Ways to help your son or daughter grow athletically and personally.
- 3. Concerns about your son or daughter's behavior or attitude.

Issues not appropriate to discuss with coaches

- 1. Playing time.
- 2. Team strategy.
- 3. Play calling.
- 4. Other student-athletes.

<u>The next step</u>

If you or your son/daughter has appropriate questions or concerns, we encourage you to take the following steps:

- 1. Encourage your son/daughter to talk candidly with the coach expressing questions and concerns at a time convenient to both your child and the coach.
- 2. If, as a parent, you still have questions or concerns, you should contact the coach personally and arrange an appointment to talk.
- 3. Please do not attempt to confront a coach before or after a contest of practice. These can be emotional times for both parent and coach. Meetings of this nature do not promote resolutions.
- 4. The final step is to contact the athletic administration and discuss the situation to determine any appropriate action. Any questions you have should be directed to the athletic administration (716) 874-8411 ext. 4.
