Gym Class: A Teacher's View




Later in the fall, Kenmore East reciprocated by hosting fifteen students from Kenko High School in Japan.



CHAD SCHLEE placed second in the 400 free relay and seventh in the 200 back.






PRE-8:10 Life At Kenmore East
