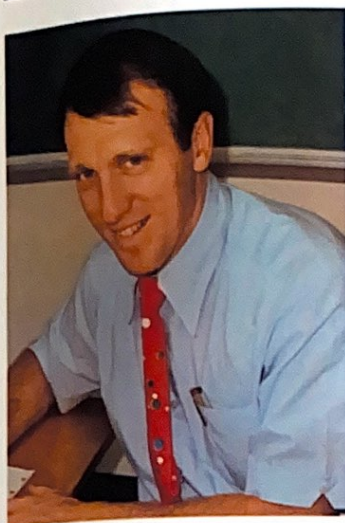
CHAD SCHLEE placed second in the 400 free relay and seventh in the 200 back.

MR. TOCKE once again participated in both the shot-put and discus events.

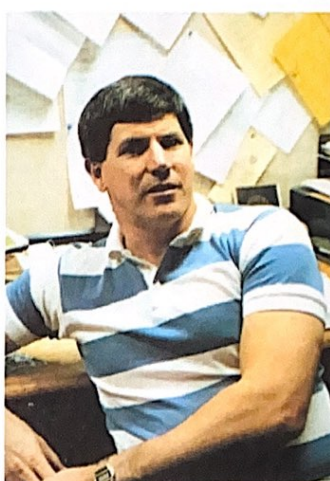

## Senior Class President Annette Villanueva Reflects

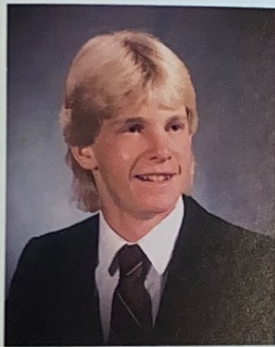




At the end of our path of *LIFE* is graduation. However, this obviously is not the end but the beginning of *LIFE* in the *Real World*. You'll decide which road to take.

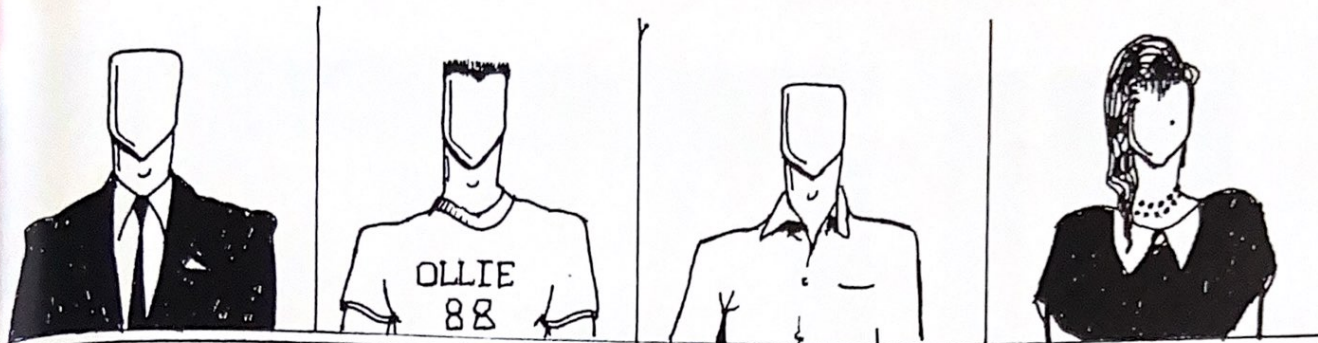
