Seasons of the Heart



When I reached the top, I hugged my best friend. We cried together thinking about the momentous occasion we were sharing. We then walked with our group to the spot that had served as a synagogue so many years ago. One of our counselors had carried a Torah on his back from the bottom of the mountain, and some of the boys in the group read from it during our morning service. I felt the true strength of my religion at that point, and I somehow felt a strong bond with the Jews who had

prayed there hundreds of years before. At the conclusion of the service, my group was given a tour of the sights. There is a lot of history, and we all learned a great deal. At 11:00 A.M., we piled into a



Peer teams are specially trained small groups of eighty dedicated, caring, concerned juniors and seniors at Kenmore East who volunteer their time and energy to share their concern about drug and alcohol abuse with fourth, fifth, and

sixth graders.

Students are provided with basic format and specific goals for each grade level; then each group develops its own skit to personalize the program. The fifth grade program centers around the IALAC story-I Am Likable And Capable—and emphasizes a link between positive self-esteem and the ability to resist negative peer pressure. Good decision-making is the focus of the sixth grade program, and fourth graders learn to turn to caring adults through a newly developed puppet show.

The key to the success of Peer Team is the power of role models and the positive impact older students have on elementary students who look up to their high school counterparts. Through peer teams the fourth, fifth, and sixth graders learn about the dangers of drug and alcohol abuse. But, more importantly, they see high school students who are positive role models for staying drug free . . .

(ans.) THEATRE ARTS SOCIETY DRAMA CLUB


















(ans.) CHEERLEADERS



 A: Our sister schools are Kenko High School in Japan and the Instituto de Alaguela in Costa Rica.


Q: How can students become involved in Exchange Club?


Q: Who benefits from Exchange Club?
