The highlight of the dual meets came against North Tonawanda. The Bulldogs pulled together and fought until the last relay where the opposition was just a little too strong.

At championship meets the team also pulled ahead with its quality competitors, finishing 4th at the N.F.L. meet with first places by Stephanie Tassiopulos in two events and Marci Butler in one. At the Section VI meet, East finished 8th with only eight competitors, and in the preliminaries many swimmers reached personal goals. In finals, second-place finishers were Michelle Kurbiel and Butler, both of whom continued to the State meet. Tassiopulos finished 4th and 8th, Kristy Donn finished 13th in her event, and the 400-free relay finished 6th with its best time in two years.


CHAMPIONSHIP FOR KENMORE EAST:


season.



With several players returning next year, Coach Matteson is looking forward to another winning season.





Boasts Five Wins


Bulldogs Are "Set" To


1987-The Year

When Charles Dickens penned, "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness . . .," he could have been referring to 1987- a year filled with cries of joy as well as sorrow. According to U.P.I.'s annual 1987 summary, "politicians turned into soap opera stars, evangelism often looked more like hedonism, sex and making a buck on the stock market seemed equally dangerous . . . and we were cheering the Russians on the streets of Washington."

Wall Street reached unprecedented heights and then suddenly, without warning, dropped to its all time low on October 19 with a \$500 billion market collapse, the worst panic of modern times-worse, even, than the crash of 1929. The Dow Jones industrial average dropped 602.75 points in October, but by year's end, no major recession was in sight.

With the Iran-Contra affair dominating the news last summer, an unknown Lt. Colonel named Oliver North was transformed

into a national hero while President Ronald Reagan's standing in the opinion polls dropped, then later resurged with the coming of the Washington Summit in December and the signing of the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces Agreement by the President and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev. They met for three days in December, signing a treaty to ban medium-range missiles that drew praise from most liberals and criticism from many conservatives.



A desire among Americans to improve relations with hostile nations in the Middle East changed to animosity toward those nations with the loss of American lives in the Persian Gulf. Kuwaiti oil tankers were reflagged and placed under U.S. Navy escort; during the crisis, an Iraqi fighter scored a missile hit on the frigate USS Stark, killing 37 Americans.



Another tragedy was the crash of Northwest Airlines Flight 255 on August 16 near Detroit. 156 people were killed, including two motorists, as the flaming

plane slid onto the highway. Cecelia Cichan, a four-year-old girl, was the only passenger to survive.

American Christians were shocked by the PTL scandal involving the financial affairs of Jim and Tammy Bakker and Reverend Bakker's "fling" with a younger follower named Jessica Hahn. The Rev. Jerry Falwell, another television evangelist, took over the ministry while the saga became an ongoing story that, at year's end, had not yet been played out.

Religious controversy stretched to Rome where Pope John Paul II consented to give a papal audience to alleged Nazi criminal, Austrian President Kurt Waldheim. This visit incensed American Jews but did not detract from a warm welcome for the Pope by U.S. Catholics when His Holiness visited the United States in September. He toured southern and western cities, bolstering his reputation and triggering widespread discussion of the differences between the hierarchy in Rome and the more liberal American Catholic Church.

In Review-1987



Fireworks boomed, bells rang, and the star spangled banner flew proudly as the people of America celebrated the 200th anniversary of the United States Constitution last July. A national celebration in Philadelphia completed the commemoration. Not long after the extravaganza, the Constitutional process in the judicial wing made the headlines as the Supreme Court searched for a new associate justice to fill the seat of retired Judge Lewis Powell. After three attempts on President Reagan's part to fill the vacancy, a "suitable" candidate

had still not been approved at year's end.



After Judge Robert Bork was turned down by the Senate for being "too conservative" and Judge Douglas Ginsberg withdrew his name because of his past use of marijuana, Reagan proposed Judge Anthony Kennedy, who was considered to be both qualified and acceptable to the Senate.


Gary Hart also made headlines on the political scene when he withdrew from the presidential race because of his affair with Donna Rice and then at

year's end entered the race again.

Children caught America's eye in 1987 when young Lisa Steinberg lost her life at the hands of her parents' abuse. "Dear Mr. Jesus," a powerful song about the tragedy of child abuse, brought tears to eyes where there had previously been joy for the rescue of little Jessica McClure from a well where she was trapped for fifty-eight hours. The nation kept a vigilant watch on Midland, Texas, where workers drilled through solid rock to reach the child and finally pull her to safety.

The year in sports was quite eventful. Not only were the amateurs preparing for the Olympic Games, but the pros also gave us many memorable moments. The N. Y. Giants won Super Bowl XXI, and in the fall the NFL endured an unsuccessful and frustrating strike although, in the end, the Buffalo Bills had a solid season --- their best in years. They acquired Cornelius Bennett in the trade of the decade and drafted Shane Conlan; both actions laid a foundation for an eventual championship team. In baseball, the Minnesota Twins won the World Series, and the Buffalo Bi-


sons played their last game in War Memorial Stadium.


