


### Director's Note

## Academics: The Backbone Of Success










## Dances: The Big Social Event







Mr. Keasling and Ms. Field spend a pleasant afternoon watching their favorite team, the KE Bulldogs.







keeping. Ms. Field says that disciplining the same students day



Although our support staff likes to dream a little, they are very serious and conscientiouses about their roles at KE. The support staff believes that they




are an important part of every KE student's life. Whether someone needs






Picture the guidance office without secretaries and career aides. What














### The Best Of Times




## The Plot Thickens

Instantly, I hit my starting stance, but the doubt returns. Two miles ... 8 laps ... it's a long run, but I can do it. I hope.


"Bang!" I have the strange feeling that the starter has shot me, but I begin running.



One and a half hours later, only two courts remained occupied. The number of spectators had grown in size behind each court. Everyone became silent except for the background yells of the practicing football team.






