

8 Homecoming






The last factor in homecoming is the football games. This is when Kenmore East fans can show support for their school. No matter how they play, Kenmore East students have proven that they can work as a team.



make it look extra special. Even though I didn't have hours to get ready, I didn't care. Looking around and seeing my friends pitch in and help, brought the season closer and made me




In August we pick through all the muddy sneakers and jock straps and bras and put the useable clothes into clean bags and deliver them to the goodwill store.
