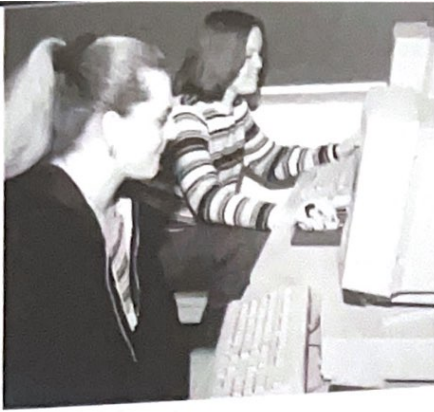

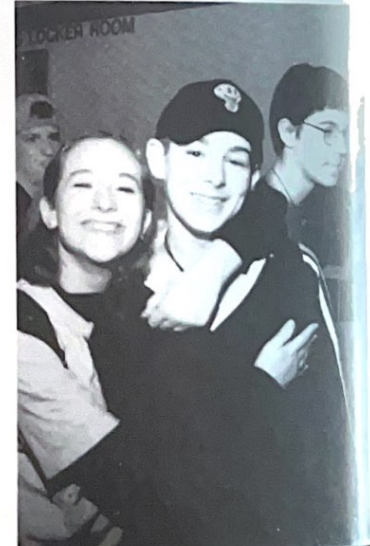
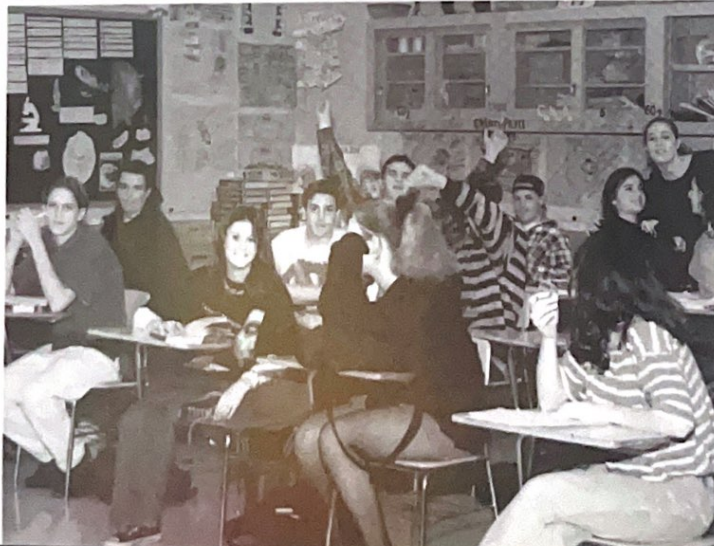

We connect with knowledge from teachers everyday in our school work and the teachers are always willing to go the extra mile to guarantee



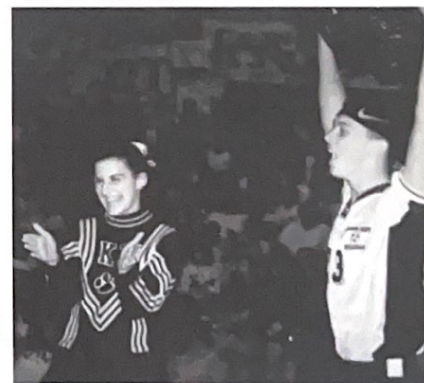

Regardless of their personal tastes, most students agree

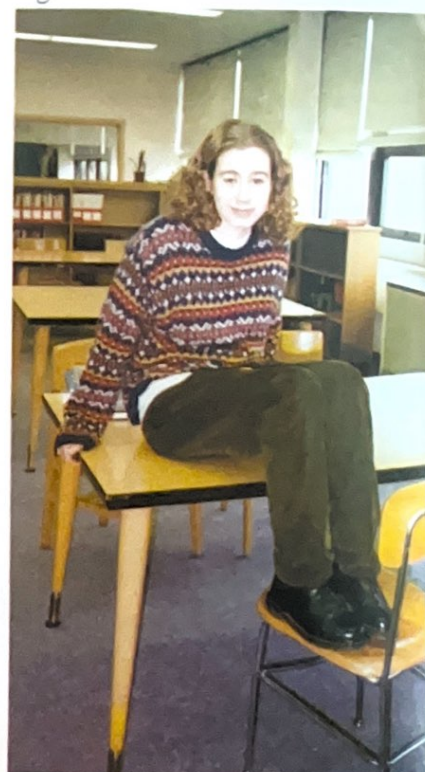


that looking good is important. "Fashion is a big part of my life," states eleventh grader Nicole Insalaco.

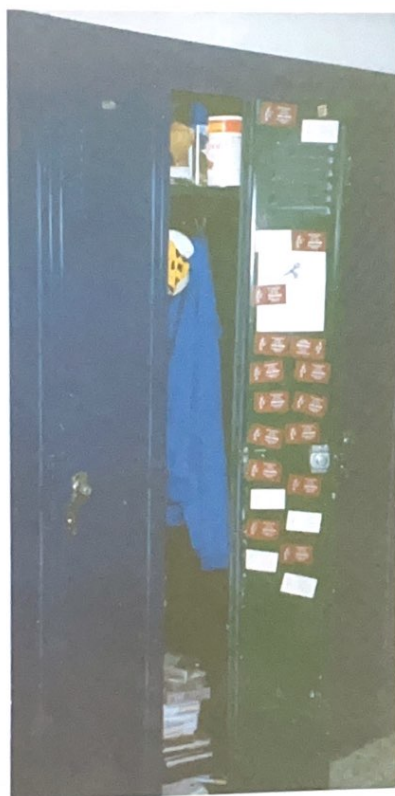






Lockers express a student's style as much as his or her clothes do. Students in all four grades were polled to find out what they put in their lockers to make them their own. The top ten responses are as follows:

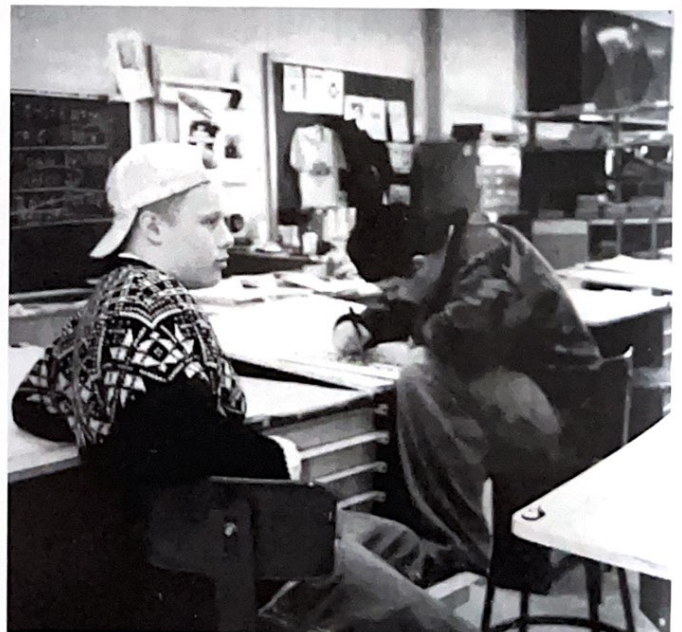
