On Tuesday, May 18, the Ken-Ton School District community will have the opportunity to vote on the proposed 2021-22 school year budget at the annual Budget Vote & Board of Education Election. Thanks to several years of strategic investments and careful fiscal stewardship, our District remains in a strong financial position. This helped us meet the challenge of the COVID-19 pandemic, which the lowest increases in approximately 20 years. resulted in significant unexpected expenditures. The estimated tax bill increase on a \$100,000 For example, in order to ensure student learning full-market-value property will only be \$34.50 in a remote setting, we secured a device for every student, fulfilling a multiyear objective in only a few months. Also, we acquired large quantities of personal protective equipment and other materials to minimize the risk of transmission and ensure the safety of students, families and staff as we reopened schools. We are optimistic about reports that school districts will soon see an influx of funding to cover some of those costs. However, districts are waiting for details such as additional telecommunications and insurance, the District amounts, potential offsets in state aid, timeline for disbursement, and other factors.

Our focus as a school district has shifted to include not only the future academic success of our students, but also the learning loss created by this pandemic as well as the health and safety considerations it has posed. The proposed 2021-22 budget will help us meet these objectives and continue to position us for future success.






#### **Historical Comparison of Tax Rate Increases**




## **2021-22 Revenue by Category:**

# **Voting Information**

#### **Voter Oualifications:**

- In-person voting will resume this year with the ability to request absentee ballots for qualified reasons.
- Voters must be a U.S. citizen, 18 years of age or older, and a resident of the district for 30 days prior to the vote.
- an affidavit confirming that they are a qualified voter.
- Photo identification and proof of citizenship, age, and residency are required for those who are not registered.

#### **Absentee Ballot Information:**

- Contact the District Clerk at (716) 874-8400 ext. 20342 for an absentee ballot application.
- Those on the permanent absentee ballot list do not need to apply for an absentee ballot.
- Those who are not registered to vote will need to complete Applications must be received no later than seven days prior to May 18, 2021.
  - Absentee ballots must arrive no later than 5 p.m. the day of the vote on May 18, 2021.

Sample Ballot (Propositions)
PROPOSITION 1: 2021-2022 BUDGET  RESOLVED, that the basic budget of \$172,426,830 for the Kenmore-Town of Tonawanda Union Free School District for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2022 as presented by the Board of Education, is hereby approved and adopted and the required funds therefore are hereby appropriated and the necessary real property taxes required shall be raised by a tax on the taxable property in the District to be levied and collected as required by law.

PROPOSITION 2: ACQUISITION OF SCHOOL BUSES AND SIMILAR VEHICLES (AND RELATED EQUIPMENT) RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Kenmore-Town of Tonawanda Union Free School District, Erie County, New York (the "District"), is hereby authorized to purchase school buses and similar vehicles (and related equipment) for use in the transportation program of the District, at an estimated maximum cost of \$1,020,000 (with such estimated maximum cost reflecting the value of any trade-ins), and to expend therefor an aggregate sum not to exceed \$1,020,000; and be it further
RESOLVED, that the sum of \$1,020,000 (which may include certain up-front financing costs), plus an amount for interest thereon, shall be funded by the levy of a tax upon the taxable property of the District and collected in annual installments as provided by Section 416 of the Education Law; and be it further
RESOLVED, that in anticipation of such tax, bonds or other obligations (including, without limitation, obligations arising under leases, lease/purchase contracts or installment purchase contracts having a term of not more than five years) of the District shall be issued or entered into in accordance with applicable provisions of New York State law; and be it further
RESOLVED, that New York State Transportation Aid funds expected to be received by the District are anticipated to offset a substantial part of such

costs, and such funds, to the extent received, shall be applied to offset and reduce the amount of taxes herein authorized to be levied.
